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The C.A.M.P. Framework

The world of high-performance youth sports can be overwhelming. The C.A.M.P. Framework is a simple guide to help parents and caregivers ask the right questions and evaluate opportunities for their child. Use this framework to make informed decisions and avoid common pitfalls.

C - Credibility

- Who is the organization? Investigate the program, camp, or group. Is it well-known in the sport, or a newer name? Check for affiliations with official sports bodies.
- What is their reputation? Look for feedback and testimonials from other parents and athletes. Do they have a good track record?
- How do they scout? Be skeptical of vague claims of "scouting." A legitimate opportunity can typically provide specific details about how they found your child (e.g., "We saw Brendan play in the provincial championship game on July 15th.").

A - Authenticity

- **Does the offer feel genuine?** Beware of generic, mass-produced emails that lack personal details about your child's skills or performance.
- **Is there pressure to act now?** High-pressure sales tactics like "limited-time offers" are often a red flag. Legitimate opportunities generally don't require an immediate decision.
- **Is the communication professional?** Check for poor grammar, spelling errors, or an unprofessional tone in their communications.

M - Motivation

- What is the core purpose? Is the program focused on true athletic development, or is it a for-profit venture selling an "elite" experience?
- Who are the coaches? Research the credentials and experience of the coaches and staff. Are they respected experts in the sport?
- What are the outcomes? Be wary of programs that guarantee college scholarships or professional opportunities. Focus on what the program can realistically provide, like unique training or exposure.

P - Practicality

- What is the cost? Get a clear, all-inclusive breakdown of fees, including registration, travel, and lodging. Does the value of the camp or program justify the cost?
- What is the return on investment? What are you really getting for your time and money? Is the opportunity providing something unique, or could you get a similar experience from a more established, local program?
- **Does it fit your family?** Consider the financial and time commitment. Does this opportunity align with your family's overall goals and values?
